Nursing Team Update

One of our Nurses had some unplanned absence for the month of March 2022, this did result in some nursing clinics being cancelled. We have managed to find a Locum Nurse so that we could rebook these cancelled clinics back in, this may have caused some inconvenience to patients, we do apologise for this.

Appointments

There are over 6 million people waiting (at November 2021) to be seen at the NHS Hospitals. This places even more pressure on GP Practices, please do turn up for your appointment with your Nurse/Healthcare Assistant / Clinical Pharmacist / or Doctor. Covid-19 infections still arise, this also effects the clinical staff who work at the practice and appointments will be cancelled at last minute when clinical staff are absent.

Change GP Requests

We are getting several change GP requests; this is where the patient's named GP is requested to be changed for another GP. Please be aware that if the GP you request already has a full list of patients, then you will be allocated to a GP who has gaps in their patient list. This then reduces a GP having too many patients on their list and reduces their patients from having to wait longer to see them for a routine appointment. From time to time the GP lists are amended so that the spread of patients is equal across the GP's who work at the Practice. A GP who works four days a week will have a patient list double that of a GP who works two days a week. The Practice always attempts to send patients a text to notify them of the change on their named GP, failing this an email will be sent, failing that then a letter will be sent out.

Staff Changes

Barbara Howe the Clinical Pharmacist is leaving the team at the end of March 2022. She may still be about in the Downland Pharmacy for a few months as she has elected to undertake Pharmacy Locum Work. The Downland Practice are in the process of recruiting a new Clinical Pharmacist. A Clinical Pharmacist role is becoming more embedded at the surgery, they undertake medication reviews for patients and can see patients for chronic health disease reviews and some can deal with urgent on the day patients. This is freeing up GP time so that the GP's can see other patients with more complexed needs that take longer than the standard 10-minute GP appointment.
